Priorities for Northern Ontario Population Growth

12 October 2021 – The Magnetic North 2021 Conference Report highlights short, medium, and long-term priorities established out of dialogue exchanged during the June 2021 online Magnetic North Conference. What was consistently raised can be summarized in these key points:

- 1. Extension of population growth discussions to include Indigenous peoples, secondary and domestic migrants, and actors in small and rural communities.
- 2. Regional, organizational, and individual-level buy-in and collaboration.
- 3. Identification and promotion of what is available in our regions.
- 4. Programs and initiatives BY and FOR the communities they are intending to benefit.
- 5. Continuous measurement of progress and lessons learned.

These points ought to be reflected in the individual actions and strategies of every organization or community looking to maintain and growth the population in any of our Northern Ontario regions. And, they have been.

Starting in February 2020, decision-makers in Ontario's northern regions have met annually to exchange ideas about Northern Ontario population growth efforts. After hosting the initial conferences, it became clear that there is an abundance of work being done to combat racism, further reconciliation, and welcome newcomers across Northern Ontario. However, connection, coordination, and communication between these efforts is needed to maximize the impacts of these efforts.

To continue with this work, over 250 people representing more than 120 organizations gathered virtually over two days in June 2021 to lay out a plan for attraction, retention, and reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in Ontario's Northern Regions.

The Magnetic North Program officer, based at Northern Policy Institute, will support all committed partners in pursuing the priorities set out at the annual conferences and the next progress report is due at the 2022 conference set for June of next year.
