Positioned for Growth - City of Temiskaming Shores

MAR 10, 2022 – The City of Temiskaming Shores is better situated for economic and population growth than other communities in Northern Ontario and Canada. In terms of quality of life, education, and job opportunities the City is well positioned. This despite the social and economic disruption of the COVID-19 pandemic.

On the Shores of Opportunity: An Economic Profile of Temiskaming Shores analyzes the economic and demographic trends in the community of Temiskaming Shores to make projections about its future growth. This information can be used to guide labour market and economic development planning for the city. This work has been carried out through Northern Policy Institute's Northern Analyst Collective program and builds off a profile developed in 2020.

Temiskaming Shores is benefiting from a growing population, high rates of employment, and lower rates of unemployment compared to other communities in both Northern Ontario and Canada. This is combined with lower costs of living and an excellent quality of life rating. As well, there are many economic and social opportunities for individuals from minority groups, such as Francophone-Canadians and Indigenous Peoples. Temiskaming Shores has promising economic prospects.

"Data is now, more than ever, important to recovery and growth," said James Franks, economic development officer for the City of Temiskaming Shores. "Being a part of NPI's Northern Analyst Collective program has made the profile possible and is one step of many that I and others can use to for local planning efforts."
