

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Northern Policy Institute is a **think tank** that conducts **independent** policy work, to provide **evidence-based solutions** to sustain and grow Northern Ontario.


- Independent authors are free from interference from everyone, including us

Demographic Trends Little Population Growth in Greater Sudbury


TOTAL POPULATION IN GREATER SUDBURY

Demographic Trends Labour Force is Projected to Decrease in Greater Sudbury...



INDIGENOUS SHARE OF THE LABOUR FORCE








Socio-Economic Consequences Skills shortage as workers will retire




HUMAN CAPITAL INDEX FOR THE WORKING AGE POPULATION, 2011




NET MIGRATION - GREATER SUDBURY



REQUIRED ANNUAL NET MIGRATION - GREATER SUDBURY


Annual Net Migration, Target 1: DDR constant at 2015 level - • Average Annual Net Migration, Target 1
