

WHY WE NEED TO GROW OUR NORTHEASTERN ONTARIO COMMUNITIES

For the purpose of this document, the Northeastern Ontario Region is defined as the districts of: Cochrane, Timiskaming, Nipissing, Parry Sound, Sudbury, Manitoulin and Algoma, and the Greater Sudbury area.



The declining and aging population in the region are by far the factors that have, and will continue to have the biggest impact on the local labour market.



IMPACT ON THE LABOUR FORCE IN NE ONTARIO
